as far as the trade in america is concerned, will say that it has not been very heavy and we have not found the occasion for putting on very many extra men. In fact we are disposing of the services of some men instead of putting on extra men. Under these circumstances I am compelled to say that the prospects are not very encouraging for you.

I hope that I will be able to attend the Tractor Demonstrations at St. Louis, but I cannot answer that question definitely at this time.

I will bear your case in mind, however, and see if there is anything that I can possibly do for you.
